Ash – Miss Peck and Mrs Hollins:

This week in Ash class we have been learning about space. We listened to the story of 'Alien school' and designed our own aliens. The children designed some very colourful and unusual aliens and thought of some fantastic names. In the story we found out that the aliens have a very strange school dinner, so we decided to write a menu for our aliens. There were lots of green slimy foods on our menu and some very smelly dishes too. The children wrote their menus with minimal support and used their phonic knowledge to help them. On Thursday we iced our own alien biscuits and added some very unusual coloured toppings. They were very tasty! We designed a patchwork picnic blanket for the aliens to use and thought carefully about colouring them in with a repeated pattern. We have thought carefully about how we write our numbers this week as the aliens found it a bit tricky in the story. We have had lots of fun using the construction in the indoor and outdoor classrooms making rockets.

Birch – Miss Hall:

This week in Birch class we have been becoming familiar with a variety of traditional tales and have been retelling the story of Cinderella, in preparation for our class assembly next week. It would be great if the children could bring in a princess, prince, knight or fairy costume on Friday for the performance. We have been practising making different amounts of money using a variety of coins. We have continued to learn about exploring the polar regions and thought about what kinds of clothes we would need to take with us on a polar expedition and why.

- Literacy: To retell a traditional tale.
- Maths: To recognise different coins.



Hazel – Mrs Campbell and Mrs Lione:

This week we finished up our Ice Age section of our topic by watching Ice Age Giants, a film re-creating the animals that would have lived in those times. Everyone was fascinated. We have now moved on to polar animals of today and have been learning a lot of facts about penguins and writing our own fact files. We've also been busy revising the maths we have covered so far and working on our reading comprehension.

Hawthorn – Miss Turner:

The children in Hawthorn class have had a good week. In Literacy the children have been learning about Newspaper reports. They have explored several reports and have identified the features. They have created a text map and used this to orally retell the report. The children have also identified the 5 W's (who, what, where, when and why) in the reports. In numeracy the children have revisited formal written methods for addition, developing their confidence and understanding further. This week in Science the children have been learning about some of the process of changing states. The children have started to develop their understanding of evaporation, condensation, freezing and melting. The children have been busy planning and carrying out an investigation into the best place to dry clothes. In PE the children have enjoyed developing their jumping and rolling skills. They have also enjoyed learning about Boudicca and designing their own warrior.

In next week's Big Write the children will be writing a newspaper report about the building of Hadrian's Wall.

- Numeracy- To use formal written methods for addition



Oak – Ms Wernham:

Next week's Big Write is on 'Newspaper Reports'

In Literacy we have started a new unit of work focusing on 'Journalistic writing'! We have read a very interesting story called 'Tuesday' and written witness accounts of the many strange happenings!

During our topic afternoons we have been looking at the first spacewalk and writing a dialogue between the two astronauts, to imagine how exciting it must have been. We have also read about the Apollo1 mission and written tributes to the astronauts who died.

- Literacy – To role-play witness accounts. To turn direct speech into reported speech.
- Numeracy – To complete maths assessments and correct any errors by working through them again.



Beech – Mrs Petty:

This week, we revisited many maths topics before our year group assessments. The children also had their mid-year assessments in reading and grammar, punctuation and spelling. After each test, we discussed the assessments and identified where there were still areas to develop. In our topic sessions, the children researched and listened to stories about life as a Victorian child, working in the mines. The children were also given the opportunity to experience how difficult it would have been working in such tight tunnels when part of the classroom was temporarily turned into a miniature version of a mine.
